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Note to the Reader

Welcome to the Revelation Leader Guide! This 9-week guide was created to help the reader methodically study through the book of Revelation. While there is much symbolism throughout this book, which at times can be challenging to understand, Jesus does desire for us to understand it, be edified and admonished by it. If this is his desire, then we also can trust that he will guide us in understanding the purpose for this book.

There are many different views when approaching Revelation which we will briefly discuss in the intro. and it is good that we strive to agree even on secondary issues, but by the grace of God we have freedom to disagree on issues that are not essential to our salvation. The two beliefs this study stands firm in are all saints must endure and hold fast to Christ and that Jesus will return in the flesh at the end of the age. Praise God! Everything is up for sisterly discussion as you go through this study.

My goal is that this study guide will help you become familiar with this book of the Bible while at the same time diving deep into Old Testament references, allowing Scripture to interpret Scripture. My hope is that this will encourage the reader to deepen their desire to know God's word and eagerly anticipate his return.

Why study the book of Revelation?

- Like the rest of the Bible, this book is meant to draw us closer to God and understand his will for the world and our lives.
- Despite many of the difficult events mentioned in this book, it's meant to encourage and help us hold fast to Christ.
- If we want to understand much of what will happen in the end times, Revelation is the book to read.

This book is, "the Revelation of Jesus Christ, which God gave him to show to his servants the things that must soon take place."

Revelation 1:1

Objectives as you study Revelation:

- Confidence in understanding the general purpose of Revelation.
- Learn several Old Testament cross references.
- To realize that Revelation is not a detached book from the Bible, but the completion of the overarching narrative beginning in Genesis that Christ is Lord and King and the mystery of him will be completely revealed at his coming.

Two important points to remember:

- The events in Revelation are not written in a linear fashion.
 - For example, when you get to chapter 13 the events mentioned in this chapter do not happen after the events in chapters 11 rather it is the same time period from a different perspective; the perspective of the beast's reign.
 - The Day of the Lord is alluded to in chapters 6, 11, 14, 15, 19
- The book of Revelation is a consistent story about the endurance of the saints until Christ returns.

The Four Views of Revelation

There are several different views or interpretations of the book of Revelation which are briefly described below; details will be added where it makes sense throughout the study. You might find that you are not a clean fit for any view, but instead a combination. For more in-depth info on each view and how they approach every chapter in the book of Revelation, I recommend reading “Revelation: A Parallel Commentary” by Steve Gregg.

Historicist: The prophecies of Revelation have been unfolding gradually for the last 2,000 years.

Preterist: The prophecies of Revelation are not future but are past, taking place during the time of the 1st century.

- Partial preterist: Believe majority of the events have happened in the book of Revelation with exception of the second coming of Christ.

- Full-Preterist: Believe everything has happened including the resurrection and the second coming of Christ. Beware of this view, because the view that the resurrection has already happened is strictly condemned in Scripture. 2 Tim. 2:16-18. Every person living on earth will see Jesus physically return. Matt. 24:27. The Bible does not allude to a secret or spiritual second coming. 2 Thess. 2:1-4.

Futurist: The prophecies in Revelation are primarily future and happen with a short span of time

Idealist: “This view does not attempt to find individual fulfillments of the visions but takes Revelation to be a great drama depicting transcendent spiritual realities. Fulfillment is seen either as entirely spiritual or as recurrent, finding representative expression in various historical events throughout the age.” Revelation: Four Views” However, they view the second coming to be a literal physical return of Christ.

Overview cont'd

Sub Views

The four main interpretations on the previous page are the general views many apply when studying Revelation. Sub-views are interpretations that tend to be applied to certain topics in Revelation ie, the Tribulation, 144K, the Rapture, and the Millennial Reign. Below are just a few sub views.

- Pre-Trib Rapture view (dispensationalism)
 - The Church will be raptured before the 7- year tribulation.
- Post-Trib Rapture view
 - The Church will be present during all 7 years of the tribulation.
- Pre-Millennialism view
 - Jesus will come back before the millennial reign.
- Amillennialism view
 - The millennial reign is symbolic and began after Christ's ascension into heaven 2000 years ago.
- Post-Millennialism view
 - Somewhat similar to amillennialism, we are in the millennial reign right now, and as the gospel continues to be preached, the earth will become more and more peaceful, then Christ will return.

Section 1: Chapters 1–3

A: Key Points

- Chapters 1–3 establish the purpose/reason for the revelation John receives: To show the servants what must soon take place.
- All seven churches received the entire book of Revelation along with each church's encouragement or warning.
- The 7 lampstands symbolize the churches that are going through intense persecution.
- Jesus is returning soon, so they are encouraged to repent and endure.

B: Talk it Out

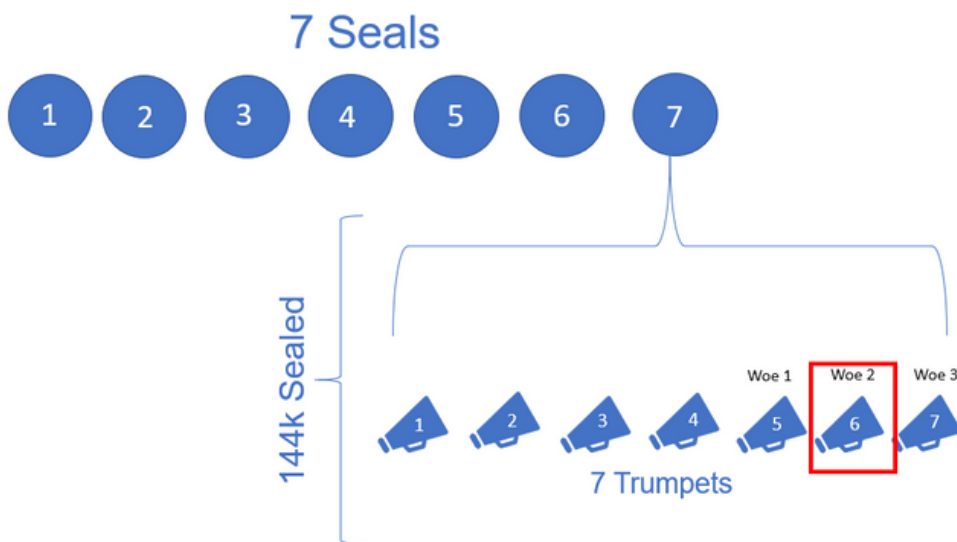

C: Takeaways

- The time just prior to Christ's return will be a time of chaos and intense persecution for the believers on the earth at that time.
- The first half of the tribulation will be marked by God's wrath poured out on the ungodly via the two witnesses (two olive trees/lampstands). The second half will be marked by Satan's wrath in the form of persecution against the saints. The second half is known as the great tribulation.
- The saints are told to endure this persecution and wait for Christ.
- The ascension of Jesus to heaven prohibits Satan from approaching God in heaven to accuse the saints. He's cast down to earth and filled with wrath and will feverishly work to persecute and kill the rest of God's offspring, the church.

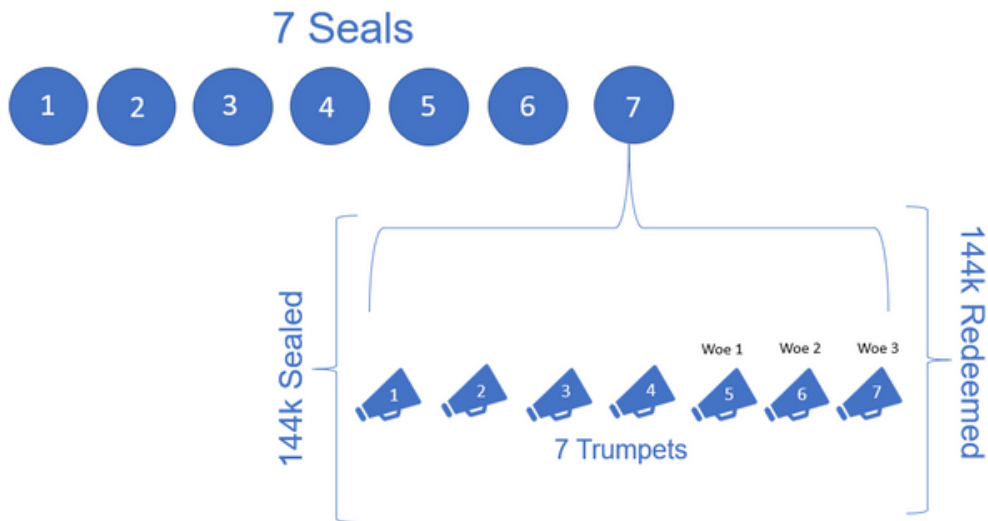

C: Takeaways

- To take the mark of the beast is to pledge allegiance to Satan whether one is aware of it or not. Do not take the mark of the beast.
- The saints are to endure and wait until Christ redeems them and saves them from the wrath to come.
- Christ harvests the wheat (the saints) in Rev. 14:14-6 and treads the grapes (ungodly) in the winepress of his wrath which are the seven bowls.

A: Key Points

- God's wrath is only reserved for those who have rejected God through idolatry/false gods/friendship with the world. Believers will not endure the wrath of God.
- The seven plagues are the winepress of God's wrath [see Rev. 14:19–20]
- The mystery of Babylon the great and the beast are further explained
- Babylon the great would represent all false religions (idolatry) and the beast represents corrupt political power

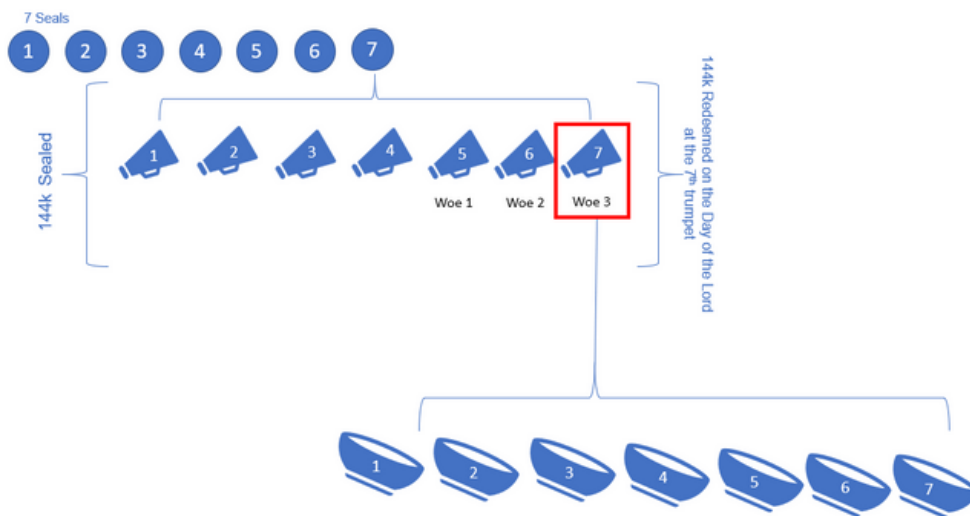

Remember at the sound of the 7th trumpet Jesus is coming back, believers are caught-up and resurrected at the revelation of Christ.

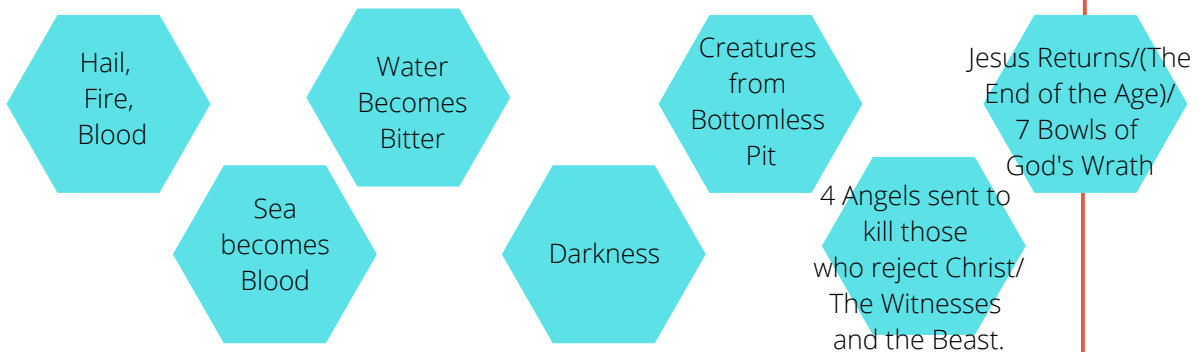
The 7 Seals are a general overview of world history, the tribulation has not yet started in the seals. Conquest, war, famine, death by plagues and persecution of the saints has been the way the world has operated since Genesis. Read Matt. 24:6-8. The first 5 seals are not signs of the end of the age. The signs of the end are the abomination of desolation and the great tribulation that follows. Read Matt. 24:15-31

World History



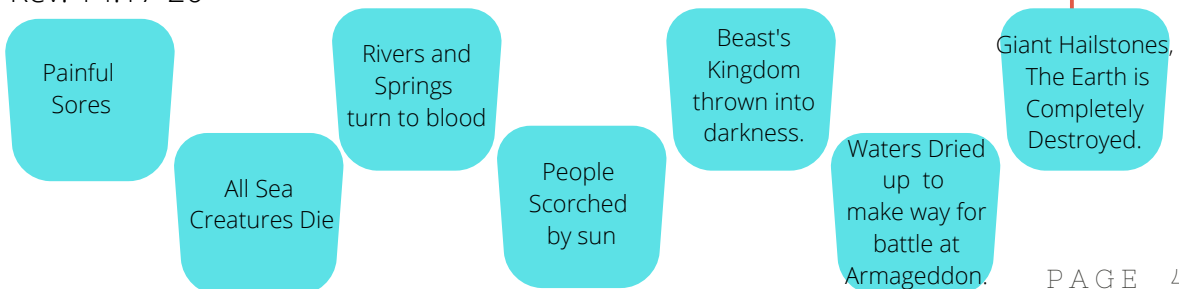
In general, the trumpets are judgments from God on unbelievers. The 6th trumpet contains the 7 year tribulation. Chapter 12 explains why Satan persecutes the saints from a spiritual perspective while chapters 11 and 13 are from the earthly perspective. Take note of the power of the witnesses in chapter 11 and the catastrophic events in chapters 8 and 9. God's servants (the saints) are protected (sealed in ch. 7) from all the events of the trumpets **except the persecution from the beast (Satan).**

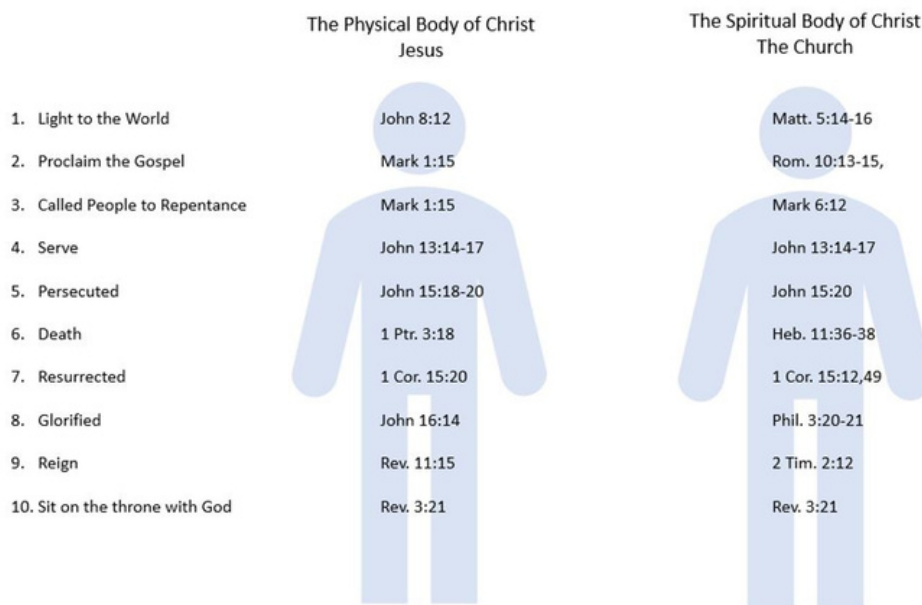
The Body of Christ: Physical and Spiritual Parallel

During the time of John's vision, the churches and John were being heavily persecuted, and Jesus' main point of encouragement and warning to the churches is that he's coming back soon, so continue to endure and hold fast to his name even if that meant death. Christ has yet to return, so what does this mean for the church today?

In general, the bride of Christ should expect persecution, even though in the western world we currently have no fear of persecution, many members in the body of Christ are currently suffering and dying for Jesus.

2 Timothy 3:12 says, "Indeed, all who desire to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted..."

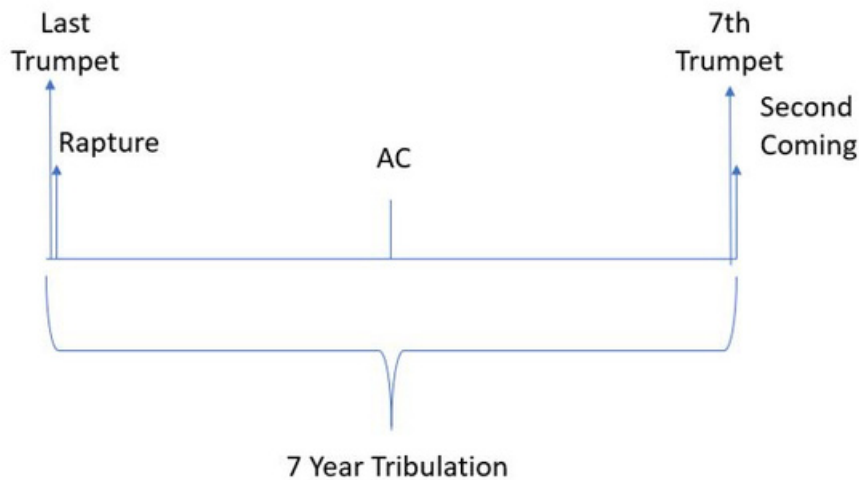
The book of Revelation is about enduring in the midst of intense persecution. As the body of Christ, we should not only expect the blessings that come along with belonging to Christ, but also the suffering. We must realize the spiritual body of Christ is just like the literal body of Christ in that we are called to be like him and do what he did. Reasons for Pre-Tribulation Rapture

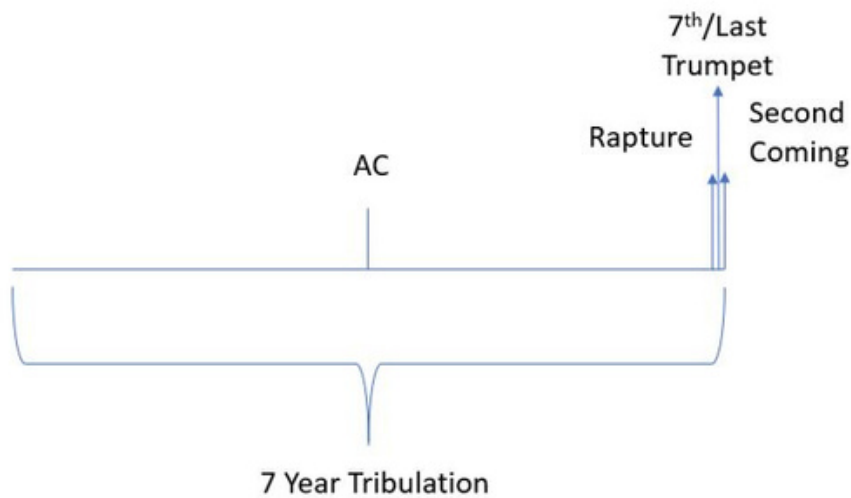


1. The tribulation/great tribulation is God's wrath and the church will not have to endure God's wrath.
2. The rapture happens 7 years before Christ returns. He doesn't completely reveal himself, but comes down partially, and the church is caught up to meet him in the air.
3. The church is mentioned in chapters 1-3 but not again until ch. 19, and this is because of the rapture.
4. The rapture occurs without warning and there are no signs, the church simply vanishes.
5. The last trumpet in Matt 24 and 1 Cor. 15 is not the same trumpet in Revelation 11.
6. The tribulation is a time for the Jews to endure and be tested, but not the church, so we are taken, so he can reconcile Jews back to himself.
7. The rapture must take place before the tribulation, because the Holy Spirit is the "restrainer" spoken of in 2 Thess. 2:6. Once the Holy Spirit is removed from the earth then the tribulation will begin, and anyone who gets saved during the tribulation are tribulation-saints.

• **Dispensationalism:** It's important to note the pre-tribulation view stems from the view of dispensationalism which teaches that the Bible is broken into seven dispensations. According to this view, the 6th dispensation is reserved specifically to test the Jewish (and gentile) unbelievers who have rejected their Messiah. Therefore, the church must be taken out of the way for God to deal with his people. For more information check out Gotquestions.org or read "Prophecy for Today" by J. Dwight Pentecost.

Reasons for Post-Tribulation Rapture



1. God's wrath and the Great Tribulation period are two separate events. God's final outpouring of wrath begins on the Day of the Lord which happens immediately after the 7 year tribulation.
2. Scripture tells the saints to wait patiently for the appearance of the Lord at his second coming.
3. Any verse that alludes to the rapture is associated with either or both Jesus' second coming and the last trumpet. Making the Day of the Lord and the day of rapture the same day.
4. The last trumpet in Matt 24 and 1 Cor 15 is the same in Revelation 11, because the same events happen.
5. There are verses that indicate that the rapture happens after the tribulation but there are no verses that place the rapture before.
6. The saints on the earth at the time of Christ's return are the continuing church from the day the church was established in the 1st century. Jesus and Paul spoke as if every generation could have been the generation to witness the tribulation. Therefore, they both encourage the saints throughout history to endure persecution and to be watchful for the Day of the Lord.
